

The Reunion Committee is, as always, headed by VP/Reunions, Bob Murphy (a505@juno.com, 508.394.0797), and this year, Bob is aided by Star Jorgensen (starjorgensen@hotmail.com, 309.454.3430), President/Family & Friends, and Ellen Peters (eeptx@sbcglobal.net, 214.352.7002), Treasurer/Family & Friends. With Fort Bragg as the location, retired Command Sergeant Major Ted Gaweda is the very able man-on-the scene.

Registration fee is \$75 per person and covers the cost of stocking the hospitality room, the luncheon, the banquet, and any required transportation to special events. Dates are Thursday, October 25, through Sunday, October 28. Registration Form is enclosed.

Seventy (70) hotel rooms have been reserved at Moon Hall on post, and each attendee will be responsible for their own hotel charges (estimated to be \$45 per night) at check-out. Details still need to be worked out, but it is hoped that a demonstration jump by the Liberty Jump Team, in full WWII gear out of a C-47, will take place on Friday or Saturday on Sicily Drop Zone at Fort Bragg—with a static display included.

LTG (R) Jim Lindsay has agreed to be the guest speaker for the Memorial Luncheon. General Lindsay is a former commander of the 505, the 82nd, and the XVIII Airborne Corps. Historically, the current commander of the 3rd Brigade Combat Team (505) is the guest speaker for Saturday night's banquet; however, the 3rd Brigade will be deployed until early November. Therefore, CSM Gaweda intends to ask another former commander of the 505, LTG Lloyd J. Austin III, to speak Saturday night. Quite an honor, as LTG Austin is the current Corps commander. We will still have some representation from the current Brigade, as there is a Rear Detachment at headquarters.

remeber the date, to-day it is June 5. It is a wonderful peaceful day, at least here in Nijmegen.

But 63 years ago, the world was completely different, Allies were fighting the Germans and Japanese troops. Allied troops were having a hard fight in Italy. Western Europe was still occupied, but soon it beacme something else. Normandy was subject to a big invasion. Amphibious troops were on board and on their way to the invasion beaches. Troop Carrier crews were checking the airplanes and gliders, paratroopers of the 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions were checking their equipment, attaching the parapacks and all were eager to go, afterall they had been training for this big moment.

I want to thank you for sending that book I did not want it to end, I never felt ashamed

the many tears I shed as various writing would effect me. I am so glad I had a chance to be in that war, but as I go through life I hate to admit it but I feel I lost a lot by missing the Bulge, the last battle, I went so far and lost out on it's end, John Perozzi carried on for me and can tell me all that happened, he is writing a book telling his part and I can't wait to read it. I knew what our General Gavin went through for his men and they loved him, I will never foret his speaches he has made from the hood of a Jeep, those clam bakes that he would refer to a combate jump, I do thank God he did see I made all four I see the extra work our Star Jorgenson put in that helped to make the book, God Bless you all. The time it has taken to put it together. I know I wrote my story when my mind was fresh, Time Out For Combat, it was not all hell and even combat I can't say was hell I recall my shoot outs worth thinking over as now and again I will wake up in the night and relive some of the action with a nice feeling I am still here. I have finally figured it out. World War Two has given me the memories of the kind of life I needed to end it, the many men I have met that would not have had there been no war. General Gavin in our corrispondence both figured. Sicily was our main jump for there is where we found our true values of what we were cabable of doing. His friendship has meant an awful lot to me. I want to thank Ellen Peters to for the many things she has done for me, God Bless you all.

All my life there has been a bible handy and I have read various parts of it from various books, I carried a Testement all through combat and never read a page but I thought I may one day be wounded and what better book would there be to read. Well some time back I did start reading the Bible, testements and all and I just have about four pages left, I feel good, God has been good to me and I feel he has been with me many times. My prayer before a combat Jump, "Oh God give me strength and wisdom to lead my men and do with me as you will." I know he answered my prayers. I never made promises I knew I would not keep. I left my wife and a baby boy when I went to war, I carried his little shoe next to my heart through out combat. I loved them both, but the call to war was much stronger, I was a trained soldier of over four years in the Cavalry, I just had to get back in and the Airborne was my choice, my father taught me woodcraft and I was shapshooter with the 03 Springfield rifle and other arms. I fit well into the Airborne. and belonged there. Once a Captain didn't think I was non com material but General Gavin did and I got my stripes back it was a nice feeling to know our General was behind me. I want to thank you all again for putting this book together, it is priceless.

The weather here in the UK for Memorial Day at the Madingley Cemetery was a disaster. Continuous rain, floods, bitterly cold and high winds lasting all day curtailed the ceremony and the members of the Leicester Chapter decided to cancel our arrangements to attend, much to our regret. It was reported later that we had received one month's rain in one day making driving very difficult. This was the first time we have not attended for many years, but we fully intend to make the journey to Madingley when the weather improves to place our wreath in the Chapel and pay our respects to the eleven men of the 505 who are interred there. They are:

PFC ISAAC BASARICH., PVT SHERWOOD W. BLASDEL, PFC LESLIE D. FRIES, PVT LOUIS M. KILLEBREW, PVT JAMES J. LENAGHAN, SGT HAROLD H. NICHOLS, PVT WALTER P. OLSON, PVT RALPH R. REED, CPL KENNETH A. VAUGHT, PFC ROBERT L. LEAKEY. On the 'Wall of Missing' is PFC ROBERT C. BOWMAN.

In total the cemetery holds there remains of thirty-three 82nd men. The arrangements for the service had already been confused by the change of the organizing USAAF Squadrons from Lakenheath to Mildenhall and we, like many other intended participants, never received our invitations. Everything had to be conducted by telephone at the last minute.

One member, our intrepid Sam Evans, braved the rain and attended to lay the wreath for the 101st Airborne Division. Many years ago when I was with some members of the Screaming Eagles, hearing about what we do each year at Madingley, asked us if we could to do the same for their men who are also interred there. They have thirty-six men buried there and we immediately agreed, with Sam volunteering to do the honors. In April we marked the 100th Anniversary of General James Gavin's birth with a story and a photograph in the city's evening newspaper, the Leicester Mercury. We do have a local road named after him - James Gavin Way - and they used a photograph, taken in 2004, with his eldest daughter, Barbara, standing by the road sign. The name Gavin always creates a lot of interest as the 82nd are never forgotten locally, even after sixtythree years.

I am always getting inquires about the 82nd and it is getting harder to find anybody to get the right information. Only recently I had an inquiry about a Military Police Sergeant based at the Headquarters on Braunstone Park who was a Cherokee Indian and I am still searching for his name. Can anybody help?

By the way, four days on from Memorial Day it is still raining and cold - whatever has happened to global warming? Deryk Wills.

D-DAY NUSEUM NEW ORLEANS MAY 19 – 23, 2007

I was called by Steve Droter about a week before I left for the wonderful D-Day Museum at New Orleans. Steve had invited me to attend functions, but I was not sure that I could make it. However, when he said the Henri-Jean Renaud (son of the Ste Mere Eglise D-Day Mayor) and his wife Yvette, along with our newest 505 RCT Honorary Member, Madame Auvray, the new SME Museum manager, Patric and several others, I quickly decided to make the visit and also make some video tapes for Steve. There are many D-Day eye witness reports, video tapes and films including the airborne area of Normandy drop zones, glider landings (say crashes) and all the beaches. There is also a WW II C47 aircraft and British Spitfire hanging from a very high ceiling. Hundreds of WWII mementos.

There were many meetings and on one night a wonderful BBQ at a French family's home, with hundreds of tiny, tiny crawfish. We had a great luncheon at the New Orleans World Trade Building on the top floor. All first class. A good time to converse with all our good friends from Ste Mere Eglise. After lunch we went on a SUV tour of at least 600 private homes and businesses damages by Katrina. It's a terribly depressing sight. Eighty percent are not repaired and unoccupied. The insurance companies have refused to pay for flood damage as, they claim, these homes were not damaged by Hurricane Katrina. I wish I was a Lousania lawyer!

On the night of May 22nd, we all attended a "Victory Ball" and all our French SME ladies had on evening gowns, or very beautiful formal dresses or suits. The men in tuxedos. A fantastic dinner was served with all kinds of wine (and water on the rocks for me) and chocolate desert with a special take home D-Day Museum souvenir.

Henry Kissenger was the guest speaker and he stated that he came to the United State in 1939 from Germany, applied for citizenship and was drafted in 1943. He trained at Camp Croft, SC for infantry (where I did in 1942) and wound up in the Infantry, He was in the Battle of the Bulge and later Germany. Then to Harvard on the GI Bill and a life of Government Service., you all know about.

If you are ever in New Orleans, you have to spend about three hours at the D-Day museum. Well worth a visit and now they are building a new addition next door.

We all stayed at the Monteleon Hotel in the French Quarter which was not damaged in Katrina. Some great museums and old buildings there. Lots of music. I barely got back home when it was time to take off for SME on May 31st.

Dear Family and Friends,

My Mom, who is 86 this year, sent this email to me remembering or trip on the 60th Anniversary of D-day to Normandy My family attended The Greatest Generation Memorial Exhibit created by Michel DeTrez. It was one of the highlights of our lives.

Michel published my Father's pictures and stories of the medics in his book titled, Doc McILvoy and His Parachuting Medics. I feel this book has been and honor to not only the medics of the 82nd,505th., but to all medics of all wars.

As my Father said in the writings about the medics, "War is an author's favorite subject, but it mostly relates to generals and fighting men; little is written about the medical aid man and his contribution. The exploits and lives saved by the medics were many and deserve a book of their own...A soldier, if he was not killed outright or wounded so badly that he would not live, became a human challenge. The medic felt like this soldier had every right to live, and his managing to evacuate so many of the casualties was amazing to the medical officers in both Battalion and Regimental Aid Stations. Only by his bravery, were we able to patch up and send back so many mutilated brave paratroopers to the medical teams of surgeons....To a medic, a wounded man in need of help calls for action, irrespective of where he may be. The aid man knows the risks involved, he has witnessed fellow aid men killed and wounded, yet he will unhesitatingly and repeatedly takes this risk...To them goes that highest admiration of their medical officers and those who must live or attempt to live in the front lines.."

At this time near the anniversary of D-day, I want to thank Michel DeTrez for his present work and his continued work to honor the 82nd,505th and other veterans of WW II.

My Mom,my two sisters and I hope to travel to France in 2009 for the 65th Anniversary of D-day and see Michel's museum in Carentan, The Carentan Historical Center. www paratroopermuseum.org

The worst of all wars in the world was in 1941-1945 and we pray that we will never have another like it. The only thought that I have is that God was on our side. I am including the Fact Sheets of World War II. If anyone sees this who has never seen it before they will be shocked by the number of dead and wounded.

In Ernie Pyle's Walk on the Battlefield he was able to portray the real life of the soldier when many others have failed. He had a way of describing a battlefield so vividly that it would make you feel that you were on the scene. He wrote "When we leave here for the next shore there is nothing we can do for the ones beneath the wooden crosses, except to pause and murmur: 'Thanks, Pal'."

Dear God we thank you very much for the privilege of being a paratrooper in the 505 RCT. We are all proud to have served with the best. We are so grateful for the outstanding leadership of the Troopers, Family and Friends. Many thanks for the unity and love that binds us together in a great friendship. We thank everyone who fills our ranks. Our special prayer for those who fell in battle and to those who have finished their earthly journey.

May they rest in peace.

D-DAY 2007 STE MERE EGLISE - 63 YEARS LATER

My journey to Ste Mere Eglise began on May 31st out of Boston with arrival on June 1st, 7:30 AM in Paris airport. Bill Sullivan Hq1/505 met me at the airport and picked up our Europear car for a one week rental. The Paris traffic at 9:00AM was terrible and the directions given us were wrong. We were lost several times. The route numbers are absolutely crazy and very difficult to understand (even for a Pathfinder). We finally arrived in Ste. Mere Eglise about 4:00pm at the famous "Stop Bar" for our "check in". No passport necessary! Then on to our LaFiere Manior B&B where Bill and I have been staying for many years. Move the clock ahead six hours time difference.

Saturday, June 2nd was the American Airborne event with about 75 U.S. Special Forces troopers jumping at the La Fiere DZ on a great sunny day. They are Army active duty stationed in Germany. The usual 82nd Airborne Division jump was cancelled as most of our troopers are in Iraq or Afghanistan. The LaFiere DZ area was crowded with several thousand visitors watching the jump and attending the memorial services and placing flowers at the Airborne Iron Mike statue overlooking the 1/505 LaFiere Manoir and bridge battleground.

To finish off June 2nd, the Liberty Jump Team members with (former French paratrooper) Dom Lunay, husband of Jill (F&F), had a great jump at Carentan. That team later jumped at three other towns from 2-9 June. They used a C-47, painted as they were in WW II.

The Sunday, June 3rd, Mass at the most famous ancient Ste Mere Eglise church was well attended with Father John D. Bolderson, Jr. and his brother David on the alter assisting the Pastor with Mass. Father John Bolderson, Jr. and David are the sons of the A Company bazooka man, John D. Balderson, who was awarded the DSC for knocking out the German tanks along with comrade Lenold Petersen and his assistant Marcus Heim and Gordon Pryne. My book, "No Better Place to Die", describes this battle in detail and these heroic men. The Bolderson brothers said that they have a most cherished memory for standing on their father's battleground.

On the afternoon of June 3rd, Yvette Renaud and I had a "kids party" for about eleven children between 3 and 9 years old. I brought all the little girls bracelets, necklaces and watches. For the older girls (5-9) a pocketbook. One boy had his special presents. Yvette provided all the ice cream and goodies. It was a most happy time for me to be with these children who hold the future of democracy in their hands.

On June 4th, Bill Sullivan and I spent a good part of the day at the high school talking about "Operation Democracy" and a program to exchange kids from France, USA, Jordan and other countries. This is an organization originally started between Locust Valley, Long Island, NY and Madame Simone Renaud, wife of the SME D-Day mayor. Cathy Salvas and Kay Weninger are determined to spread the word of democracy

and those valiant men and women who gave their lives for freedom. Cathy and Kay have attended Static Line Awards at Atlanta, the New Orleans D-Day Museum Victory Operation last May 19-23, and now to SME for a week. Maurice Renaud is also very much involved in Operation Democracy.

A busy day on June 5th with a splendid dinner party at Henri-Jean & Yvette Renaud home. Then fireworks at the SME church at midnight. On June 6th, there were many memorial services at the nearby towns where many men of the 82nd and 101st fought and died. All our veterans and Family&Friends drove to the Omaha Beach Colleville USA Cemetery by 10:00 AM on a beautiful day. The USA Secretary of Defense Gates gave an excellent speech about D-Day, the beginning of the end of monster Adolph Hitler. The French Minister of Defense also gave a good address on the liberation of France. I met him afterwards and requested a copy of his speech. There were only about 25 total D-Day veterans attending. We veterans are not getting any younger.

Later on the 6th at 5:30PM a formal ceremony at the SME church was held with all military and town folks. Father Bolderson, with priestly vestments, recited some memories of his father. The annual flower memorials were at the Hotel de Ville (Town Hall) and the Liberation Pylon outside the church. Mayor Marc Lefevre and Executive Joe Leprieur are hereby congratulated for their marvelous flower formal ceremonies. Mayor Mark attends every functions and is a loyal supporter of the airborne soldier providing excellent events and meals.

On the afternoon of June 6th, we had a wonderful and important ceremony at the SME Museum where I presented 505 RCT Association Honorary Membership Certificates to Comte (Count) d'Aigneux and Madame Jeanne Auvray, who are respectively the President and Secretary of the Museum. There have been some great changes and additions to this Museum as well as a very good book and souvenir shop. Henri-Jean Renaud spends a great deal of time helping upgrade the museum. The new Director-Curator Patrick, Henri-Jean and staff do a splendid job and it is obvious.

Our noted 505 RCT member, Howard Manoian and SME/Chef du Pont resident was joined by his son Chris (former 82nd trooper) and his lovely wife Gena for D-Day week. Howard is our 505 veteran man on the scene in SME. His close friend is Roger Coueffin, the owner and famous Stop Bar, where every Army trooper, Air Force crew, and veteran enjoy a beer, or two, or three all week. Maybe a shot of Calvados, alias dynamite

I was in Paris from June 8th to the 11th with my very good French skydiver friend, Yves Tariel. Yves and I made many free fall jumps over SME annually. My last skydiving was in 1994. John F. Lee Hq 2/505 and I started the first SME jumping in

1964, the 20th anniversary of D-Day. We brought over our own chutes and Madame Renaud arranged all the details and a small plane. John and I had the required International parachute licenses. Two of my most memorable jumps, 1944 and 1964, when it all started in SME. And for many years thereafter.

For a four days I Paris, I visited the Museum d'Orsey, the French Legion of Honor Museum, noting history and battles all the way back to Napoleon. An afternoon of the Hop On –Hop Off bus visiting the famous Paris sites and a ride on the Bateaux Mouches boat along the Seine River. It is a must do if you or your family visit Paris.

By next October 24th I should be well rested for our 505 RCT and F&F's Association Fort Bragg Reunion. CSM Ted Gaweda will do a splendid job, as always, and General Lindsey will be our Banquet speaker. Star Jorgensen, our Family and Friends President and Don McKeage, our 505 RCT President will see to it that you all have a wonderful Fort Bragg visit. Make your reservations now. Remember, time (and health) marches on. Keep in step. Make a commitment to meet your comrades at the home of the 82nd Airborne Division. And our Family and Friends who will carry on for us over the years.

My name is Arnold W. Peterman, Jr., I am the older of two sons of an original member of the 505 RCT. My father's name is Arnold W. Peterman and was assigned to I Co, 505 RCT and made all four combat jumps with the Regiment.

He and my mother are currently living in an assisted living center in Sands Springs, OK and receive the Panther. He is 91 years old now and is almost completely blind, has a pace maker, and has had two heart bypasses. Due to his health problems he has not been able to attend a 505 RCT reunion since the early 90's. He has asked me to write you this letter for a couple of reasons. First, he wanted to send the inclosed check for \$100.00 as a contribution to the 505 RCT Association, and to find out how many of the original members of I Co, 505 RCT are still alive. He wants very much to attend this year's reunion at Fort Bragg but I doubt that he will be able to.

Both of my sons are third generation paratroopers. My youngest son is an active duty SFC assigned to the 5th Special Forces Group and just recently returned from his second combat tour in Iraq and has one combat tour in Afghanistan. Subject: Our Panther Brigade in Iraq - Colonel Owens' Update

Panther Team,

As we enter the ninth month of our deployment in Iraq, the Panther team is busier than ever. Before I mention a few words about what our battalions have been up to, I would like to talk about the activities we have planned for All-American Week in Iraq. Unfortunately due to our daily mission requirements, we will not be able to celebrate our heritage as Paratroopers the way we usually do. Instead, on Saturday, May 26, 2007, we will celebrate All-American Day here at Contingency Operating Base Speicher. The day will begin with combat skills competitions and will end with a BBQ at the Brigade Headquarters. We will reflect on our pride as Paratroopers and the memory of those who have paid the ultimate sacrifice here in Iraq and throughout the history of our great Division.

The situation in Iraq continues to be complex and ever-changing. Although we have had major breakthroughs, there have also been set backs. The key to our success lies in our ability to provide security for the Iraqi population in Salah Ad Din Province, develop the Iraqi security forces, and to assist the provincial government in the reconciliation process between the Sunnis in the province and the largely Shia central government.

In April, Secretary Gates announced all active duty soldiers deployed to the CENTCOM area of operation will have their tours extended to 15 months. The extension will guarantee that the Brigade will spend 12 months back at Fort Bragg before its next deployment. The Paratroopers in the Brigade, along with everything else they do, took this news in stride and went about doing what they do best - accomplishing the mission.

The Paratroopers of 1-Panther have had a great deal of success in putting a dent into the oil smuggling activities at the Bayji Oil Refinery - the biggest refinery in Iraq. Bravo Company, led by Kwenton Khulman with 1SG Green by his side, has made a huge impact in turning the oil refinery around. Al-Qaeda has reacted violently to our efforts to cut one of their main sources of funding, but 1-Panther remains vigilant and continues to make progress everyday.

The Paratroopers of 2-Panther are working harder than ever trying to revitalize Samarra. Members of Al-Qaeda have been trying to assert their control over Samarra for the past two years and in the process have made life very difficult for normal Iraqis. Recently, these terrorists blew up the Police Station and killed the police chief - one of the most competent and courageous Iraqis we have worked with during our time in Salah Ad Din. However, the Paratroopers in 2-Panther, especially Charlie Company located at Patrol Base Olsen inside the city, have worked hard to restore order. The Iraqi government has decided to rebuild the Golden Mosque inside Samarra and we are working hard with our Iraqi partners to make this dream a reality. As you recall, on February 22, 2006, Al Qaeda destroyed the Golden Mosque and this terrorist act set off a spiraling escalation of sectarian tensions throughout the country. The rebuilding of this

Mosque will go a long ways in healing the sectarian divide in Iraq.

In Tikrit and surrounding areas, Task Force Loyalty has done a great job clearing out many insurgent and Al-Qaeda cells. In late March, the Paratroopers conducted an operation to clear the entire town of Ad-Dawr, just east of Tikrit, of all terrorist elements. The operation was dubbed "Operation Hershey." Terrorists in this town had tried to assert their control by destroying the police station, and intimidating anyone who worked with the Provincial Government and coalition security forces. Over a two week period, Paratroopers from TF Loyalty and their Iraqi counterparts, cordoned and cleared the entire town. As a part of our new focus on population security, they established a new operating base by Ad Dawr. Patrol Base Woodcock was named after one of our fallen heroes from Bravo Company, 2-Panther, part of Task Force Loyalty.

Our recon squadron, 5-73 Cav, has had a great fight on its hands in Diyala. Along with 3BCT, 1st Cavalry Division, these Paratroopers have been fighting some of the most extreme elements of Al-Qaeda and the Sunni insurgency. They have established several new Joint Security Stations to be closer to the Iraqi population and as a result have put themselves in a much more dangerous environment. Our Paratrooper's tenacity and courage has come to be known throughout Diyala and among the members of the other American units they serve with.

Since my last report 5-73 Cavalry has paid a heavy price. They lost 17 great Paratroopers fighting some of the most ruthless terrorists in Iraq: PFC Orlando Gonzales, SPC Jason Nunez, SGT Jason Swiger, PV2 Anthony White, SPC Ebe Emolo, CPT Jonathon Grassbaugh, SPC Levi Hoover, PFC Rodney McCandless, 1LT Kevin Gaspers, SPC Jerry King, PFC Garrett Knoll, SSG Kenneth Locker, SGT Randell Marshall, SSG William Moore, SGT Brice Pearson, SPC Michael Rodriguez, SGT Michael Vaughn (5-73). 3-8, the Combined Arms Battalion, attached to us from 3rd BCT, 1st Cavalry Division lost two officers; 1LT Philip Neel and 1LT Andrew Bacevich. Our thoughts and prayers remain with the family and friends of these brave Warriors. These losses have only strengthened our resolve to accomplish our mission. We will continue to take the fight to the enemy and to provide security for the Iraqi people.

We are disappointed that we won't get a chance to see our "Old Timers" this year, but look forward to seeing you when we get back!

THE ORIGIN OF HOO-AH

"Hoo-ah" (Hough), the familiar army sentiment which roughly means "can do" or "good job", has its origins with the Second Dragoons in Florida in 1841. In an attempt to end the war with the Seminoles, a meeting was arranged with Chief Coacoochee. After the meeting a banquet ensued. Officers of the garrison made a variety of toasts, such as "here's to luck!" and "the old grudge," before drinking. Coacoochee asked Gopher John, an interpreter, the meaning of what was said. The interpreter explained that "It means, How d'ye do!", whereupon the chief with great dignity, lifted his cup and, elevating over his head, exclaimed in a deep guttural, and triumphant voice, "Hoo-ah!"
