The 508th typically has a "Welcoming Breakfast" while the 505th has a "Memorial Luncheon" where the president lists the names of veterans we have lost since the prior reunion. On Thursday morning, October 12, we combined the two events and had a "Memorial Breakfast". Katie Trocolli listed the names of the 505th veterans we have lost since last year's reunion and Troy Palmer, President Family and Friends of the 508th PIR Assn. listed the names of the 508th veterans. Troy told a very moving story of one of the 508th veterans on the list and his father who served in the 508th PIR. A few veterans from each regiment stood up and told stories of their own of their buddies who made their final jumps in the past year. I heard from a couple of 505th veterans who said they preferred the Memorial Breakfast to the luncheon and I was very pleased to hear this. Several 508th veterans commented on how much they appreciated the reading of the names. Katie and Troy conducted the service. Father Steve Jeselnick, our new Association Chaplain, forwarded a beautiful prayer for the event. The text reads as follows:

We honor those men from our 505th and 508th and all those men and women who have given their lives from World War II, Korea, the Dominican Republic, Vietnam, Grenada, Panama, the Gulf War, Iraq, and Afghanistan. They left their families to serve their country and the mission of freedom and peace. They will always be remembered in our hearts, and we honor them with our thoughts and prayers. Give them rest in your heavenly home.

Heavenly Father, you know our thoughts, and you support us with your abiding Presence. Bless our food, and nourish us with good faith, good health, and your eternal love.

Thursday afternoon, we loaded up on busses and went to Warm Springs, GA for a visit to "The Little Whitehouse" where President Roosevelt often visited during the war to take treatments in the mineral waters there. It was here that he died in April, 1945. As we entered the town of Warm Springs, the Sheriff met us and gave us a police escort to our destination. When we arrived at The Little Whitehouse there were several school children on hand to greet the veterans. We toured the grounds, the museum and the house where the president lived while there. Included in the museum was the unfinished portrait of the president that was being painted when he died. We also visited the mineral springs where the president took his treatments.

Later we went to dinner at Bulloch House, a local restaurant in Warm Springs. The owner reserved the entire restaurant for our group. We enjoyed a wonderful truly Southern dinner. At the restaurant, we were greeted by the mayor of Warm Springs.

After dinner, we returned to the hotel where we were greeted by late arrivals, Sandy and Otis Sampson, Jr., Claire and Arthur Thibodeau, and Dawn Sampson, the daughter of Otis Sampson and the spitting image of her father. It was wonderful to see them again. I sat around with them, Katie, and Carol LaBounty reminiscing about Otis. He is sorely missed.

We also met 508th CSM Michael Clemens who was to be our guest speaker at the Saturday night banquet and his lovely wife, Christy, and daughter, Caelynn. Col. Brian Mennes, C.O. of 4th Bde, was originally scheduled to be our guest speaker, but he was called away to Afghanistan and CSM Clemens took his place. Prior to joining the 508th, CSM Clemens served as a 1st Sgt. in the 505th.

Friday morning, we boarded buses bound for Ft. Benning. We were met at the Infantry Museum parking lot by Sgts. Hernandez and Clark who were our escorts for the day. We were supposed to attend an Airborne graduation ceremony and have our veterans pin the wings on the new paratroopers, but due to inclement weather all week, the new class of paratroopers made the first of their five jumps during our visit. Sgt. Clarke gave us a demonstration of the parachutes currently in use by the Airborne school. One of the veterans asked

when they stopped using the "quick release" buttons used by the WWII veterans in Holland. Answer: the 1950's!!

We visited the Airborne walk with all the Airborne monuments and ate lunch at the "Follow Me" dining facility. After lunch we visited the Tank Simulator Facility where we were able to climb into the simulators and shoot down some enemy. I was in one of the simulators with Dawn Sampson and she was a pretty good shot!! We ended the day with a tour of the National Infantry Museum.

Upon returning to the hotel, Barbara Gavin Fauntleroy had arrived and it was really wonderful to see her again as she had been unable to attend our 2010 reunion. Seeing her was a big hit with our 508th veterans and Family and Friends members. Everyone wanted their picture taken with her and I believed she signed a few autographs as well.

Friday evening, 508th veteran, John Coates, took Barbara Gavin Fauntleroy, Barbara Fortenbaugh, Carol LaBounty, Ed Sayre, Troy and Donna Palmer and I to a wonderful steak dinner at a local restaurant. Upon returning to the hotel, out two Airborne escorts, Sgt. Clarke, and Sgt. Hernandez, had arrived at our hospitality room for a visit. Katie and Troy conducted the ceremony while 505th veteran, Duke Boswell, and 508th veteran, Rock Merritt, conducted the candle lighting ceremony.

After the banquet, most of us changed into comfortable clothing and stayed up far too late visiting. Veterans, John Perozzi and Duke Boswell, were still there when I turned in around 2:30 AM!

One of my most endearing memories of the reunion was seeing 508th veteran, Bob Chisolm, greet Ed Sayre. Bob served under Ed at the end of WWII when Ed was C.O. of the 508th's 3rd Btn. He holds Ed in the highest regard and told me that Ed was the finest officer he ever served under. On the plane home, Bob was on the same flight as Ed and I, so I traded boarding passes with him so the two could sit together and have a nice visit.

All in all, it was a wonderful reunion and I was sad to see it end. They never seem to last long enough.

Final Jumps

Paratroop Chaplain Father Philip Hannan

Trooper Joe Schwann Sent this in to F&F. Father Philip Hannan was a good friend of the 505 especially I Company. He died Sept.29 at age 98.

Ordained in Rome Dec. 8, 1939, by Bishop Ralph Hayes of Davenport, Iowa, then rector of the North American College, Father Hannan remained in Rome until the following summer, when all American seminarians were ordered by the U.S. Secretary of state to leave to ensure their personal safety. He celebrated his first Mass in the United States June 16, 1940, at St. Matthew Cathedral in Washington.

He then served as assistant pastor for two years at St. Thomas Aquinas Church in Baltimore.

In 1942, he volunteered as a wartime paratroop chaplain and served with the 505th Parachute Regiment of the 82nd Airborne Division. After cursory instructions on the ground, he took five practice jumps to earn his official status as a paratroop chaplain.

After his first jump, he was appointed "jump master" to a small crew of greenhorn jumpers and he affectionately became known as "The Jumping Padre."

In 1945, as the horrors of Nazi prisoner-of-war camps became widely known, Chaplain Hannan liberated a German camp of emaciated prisoners at Wobbelin.

A staunch defender of civil rights and the unborn as well as a fierce proponent during Vatican II of the morality of nuclear deterrence, Archbishop Hannan burnished his reputation for fearlessness in 2005 by riding out Hurricane Katrina alone at age 92 in the fortress like studios of Focus Worldwide, an offshoot of the television network he created in the 1980s.

Although the building's backup generator failed, the veteran 82nd Airborne chaplain had a ready supply of water, peanut butter and crackers -- as well as a trusty 3-wood to ward off potential looters. Five days later, he talked his way through police barricades and drove across the 24-mile causeway bridge over Lake Pontchartrain to give emotional pep talks to weary first responders.

Never the master of understatement, he called it "the easiest drive of my life."

In 2010, Archbishop Hannan published his memoirs, "The Archbishop Wore Combat Boots," which documented his career as a seminarian in Rome in the 1930s during the buildup to World War II, his service as a paratroop chaplain for the 82nd Airborne and his confidential relationship with Kennedy when he was an auxiliary bishop of Washington.

Archbishop Hannan and Kennedy were so close that first lady Jacqueline Kennedy asked him to deliver the eulogy at the assassinated president's funeral Mass on Nov. 25, 1963, at St. Matthew Cathedral in Washington. According to church protocol, that responsibility normally would have fallen to Washington Archbishop Patrick O'Boyle, who graciously allowed his auxiliary to deliver the eulogy.

In 1968, Archbishop Hannan returned to Washington from New Orleans to deliver the graveside eulogy at the funeral of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy. In 1994, he offered graveside prayers at the interment of Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis in Arlington National Cemetery.

Liege is encircled by some 10 forts, we went to see one of them on the western side of Liege, the fortress received a direct hit in her powder room and the whole fortress exploded, almost all were killed inside.

The little bridge spans the scenic Merderet River, about two miles west of the town of Ste. Mère-Église in a bucolic part of northern France. Next to it is the charming Bed and Breakfast à la Bataille de La Fière, built in 1180 as a grain mill by Viking settlers. It's a perfect destination for a quiet vacation.

But nearly 70 years ago, the little bridge was the scene of a pivotal World War II battle. Although described by the military historian S.L.A. Marshall as "the bloodiest small-unit struggle in the history of American arms," the saga of the battle for the bridge at La Fière has been all but lost among the numerous legends of D-Day. The fierce fight, waged by a small group of lightly armed paratroopers from June 6 to June 9, 1944, likely saved the lives of thousands of U.S. soldiers who landed in Normandy on D-Day.

The bridge was one of only two in the Utah Beach landing area over which German armored units could have crossed the river. If the Germans got their tanks and infantry to the beach, they could have wiped out U.S. forces there. The 82d Airborne Division was given the difficult task of seizing and holding the bridge.

Led by Lt. John Dolan, the paratroopers assaulted and eventually took control of the bridge in the late-morning hours of D-Day. They set mines and pulled a disabled truck onto the bridge to help block the inevitable German counterattacks.

Before the invasion, the Germans had flooded the fields around the causeway leading to the bridge. The men could see the parachutes and backpacks of dozens of drowned paratroopers, reminding them of what was at stake.

The Germans still controlled the high ground of the causeway west of the bridge, and late in the afternoon of June 6, they sent three tanks followed by infantry rumbling across in their first attempt to seize the bridge. Pvt. Lenold Peterson stood with his bazooka, exposing himself to enemy machine-gun fire, took out the two leading tanks, and forced the third to retreat with the infantry.

The following morning, the Germans launched an even heavier assault. The brutal, close-quarters combat that followed reduced Dolan's force to only 14 men, but the paratroopers held. The fighting was so bloody that the Germans asked for a truce to retrieve their wounded.

When Dolan's men asked at one point if they should fall back, he told them to stay, adding, "There is no better place to die." His words lifted the morale of the decimated platoon.

On June 8, Dolan's men were finally reinforced by the 507th Parachute Infantry Regiment. U.S. tanks from the Fourth Infantry Division had also arrived, but they could not cross the bridge until the Germans had been cleared from the western end. The paratroopers attacked across the bridge and down the causeway in a suicidal frontal assault. The first wave was cut down, and those behind them dropped to the ground, paralyzed with fear. Lt. Bruce Hooker, shot in both legs, tried to urge them on, shouting, "Come on - get up!" As the dead and wounded piled up, the chaos on the bridge mounted.

Just when the battle seemed lost, a group of some 90 men led by Capt. R.D. Rae charged across the bridge. Again, many were cut down, but this time many more kept moving forward. They ran down the causeway and started taking out enemy positions. The tank commanders seized the opportunity and streamed across the bridge, destroying the remaining opposition. The Americans had finally secured the bridge, though at a terrible cost: 60 paratroopers killed and 529 wounded.

A film in the works, No Better Place to Die, written and directed by the actor and former Marine Dale Dye, is expected to bring the story of this battle to the general public at last. This Veterans Day is a fitting time to remember the American paratroopers who courageously decided there was no better place to die than the bridge at La Fière.

Paratrooper Poetry

I obtained the below poem from 101st historian/author Mark Bando's Trigger Time forum. Mark introduced the poem as follows:

"The following was written in tribute to D-day paratroopers of the 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions, by a fellow trooper who belonged to HQ Co. 551st PIB. I think it reveals how bitterly troopers regarded combat-and their mortal enemies, at that time."

A Saga of June the Sixth

The C-47 was silent as a tomb except for the engines, roaring through the gloom Eighteen troopers not making a sound as flak lit the sky-up for many miles around Then came the warning; then the DZ bell and then I heard a trooper to his comrades yell:

We're jumpin' into hell boys, we're jumpin into hell By the burst of the flak and the fifties, I can tell Hang onto your chutes boys, don't mind the battle smell Til every bastard Jerry is on his way to hell.

As silent as the seagulls, they floated down the sky,
Eighteen paratroopers, unafraid to die
Some hit the flak burst, some the fifties' lead
and some felt the ack-ack whistling past their heads.
Down on the Jerries, one by one they fell
and then they heard a voice from out of the darkness yell:

We're landing down in hell boys; we're landing down in hell! Kill the Huns by the hundreds, like rats drowned in a well. Shout Geronimo boys, the stories we will tell, When every bastard Jerry is at the gates of hell.

When Normandy sun rose, twelve of them were dead, hanging from the trees, their bellies full of lead Twelve brave troopers slit from ear to ear with blood in their eyes but not a sign of fear. Twelve men they bury in the flooded dell, when from a muddy grave, they heard a trooper yell:

We're waiting here in hell boys; we're waiting here in hell, Don't despair of your fate boys, the chow is goddam swell. Don't spare the knife boys, don't spare the mortar shell Til every bastard Jerry is here with us in hell.





From The C.O. To His Men

Well, men you've done it again! For the fourth time the Regiment has gone through the trials, tribulations and harassments connected with the preparation for a Combat Mission and taken it all with a grin and a , well we're ready, what are we waiting for" attitude. For the fourth time the Regiment has dropped in the middle of the enemy, on his own ground, driven him from prepared defensive positions and held off the fanatical counter attacks of his best troops, and, in so doing, has paved the way for the rapid advance of the Allied armies And, for the fourth time the Regiment has proven whether

employed defensively or offensively it ranks high among the best combat troops in the world.

For many of you a combat mission was no nevelty. You had seen action in Sicily, Italy or Normandy campaigns or in some cases all three of them. You knew what to expect and were prepared for it. For a great number however, this was your first combat experience and there was question in your minds as to how you would react. It didn't take you long to find the answer and prove that you had the confidence and ability of veterens. But whether this was your first or fourth compaign, many of you have experienced some of the fiercest fighting seen or to be seen in this or any other war. The batt les at Riethorst, Mook, Nijmegen, Kamp and the numberous attacks at our road blocks and all along our front, as well as the many patrols sent out, called for the utmost of fighting ability, leadership and just plain "guts". Some of these fights were more spectacular then others and we will hear and read more about them in the future; Some are only known to those who actually participated in them. But regardless of what any individual or unit did we know that the successes of the Reg giment have been based only upon the readiness and ability of every individual to do his part, and more, in the particular job to which he was assigned, whether engaged in a fire fight laying wire, supplying ammunition to the front line trooper or training replacements at the base camp. Those who did not do their part have been properly taken care of. They have no. place in this unit.

One thing we must not lose is our perspective of the big picture; we must remember that other individuals and units from squads to Divisions, were in this fight, and that all had a pretty tough time. Each helped the other to keep Jerry we occupied all along his front lines. For instance, how the gallant stand of the Red Devils at Arnheim kept at least a Division of Panzers off our hands and helped insure the success of the 82nd's mission. We can brag about what we have done, but let's give the other fellow credit; and realize that we didn't do the whole thing alone.
